

Class Structure

The school is made up of 4 classes which are often mixed age groups.

Mixed age classes mean children are encouraged to care for and support each other - a skill which they learn for life. Having different year groups learning and playing together creates a wonderfully positive environment for all.

The class structure is set each year by the Headteacher and is largely dictated by the numbers in each year group.

The makeup of the classes will be set during the summer term, parents will be aware of the next academic years structure before the summer holidays.

There is a nationwide policy aim to achieve a class size limit of 30.

School Lunches & Milk

From September 2014, the Government introduced Universal Free School Meals for children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2.

The school will provide a school meal every day for the children in these years so there is no need to provide a packed lunch.

Lunches

Meals are provided by Dorset Meal Selector. A sample menu can be found in the appendix.

Children have a choice and parents have access to the menu online for the weeks ahead so they can be involved in what their child eats.

Milk

Milk is free up until children are 5 and is subsidised for all other children in primary education.

Milk is excellent as a mid-morning drink. It provides a nutritional boost and keeps children hydrated between breakfast and lunch, helping them to concentrate and learn.

Wrap Around Care - Woodland Wonders

Woodland Wonders is St Greg's wrap around care offering, it is a vibrant place to be at either end of the day.

As well as a warm welcome, children attending the Breakfast Club are offered a variety of cereals, toast and a drink. They can either watch a cartoon on the large Smart board or choose one of many activities they have in their very own personalised folder.

Later, in after school club the children have a snack and drink which could be related to their topic of the term. These topics are decided in consultation with the children and are always fun and exciting.

They have access to the new Ipads which they really enjoy using, with the added benefit of furthering their learning.

During the drier months the children have use of both the large playing field or the outside area adjacent to the club.

Currently there is a book in the reception area, if you wish your child to attend Woodland Wonders simply fill in your details.

Learning Through Experience

Payment and Billing

Pupil Progress

Assessments are an integral part of learning and progression, it is by assessing children that we plot and implement the next phase of a child's learning.

Alongside continuous teacher observations the children have statutory assessments at key stages in their primary school time

Children's progress will be reported to parents in person during both the Autumn and Spring terms in a face to face meeting with the teacher. A written report will be issued during the summer term.



St Gregory's Primary School, a Christian foundation, aims to be a place where Religious Education will:

Cognition and Learning

This includes children with Specific Learning Difficulties, Moderate Learning Difficulties, Severe Learning Difficulties and Profound and Multiple Learning Difficulties

Social, Emotional and Mental Health Difficulties

This includes any pupils who have an emotional, social or mental health need that is impacting on their ability to learn

Sensory and/or Physical Difficulties

This area includes children with hearing impairment, visual impairment, multi-sensory impairment and physical difficulties
